Editor's Message



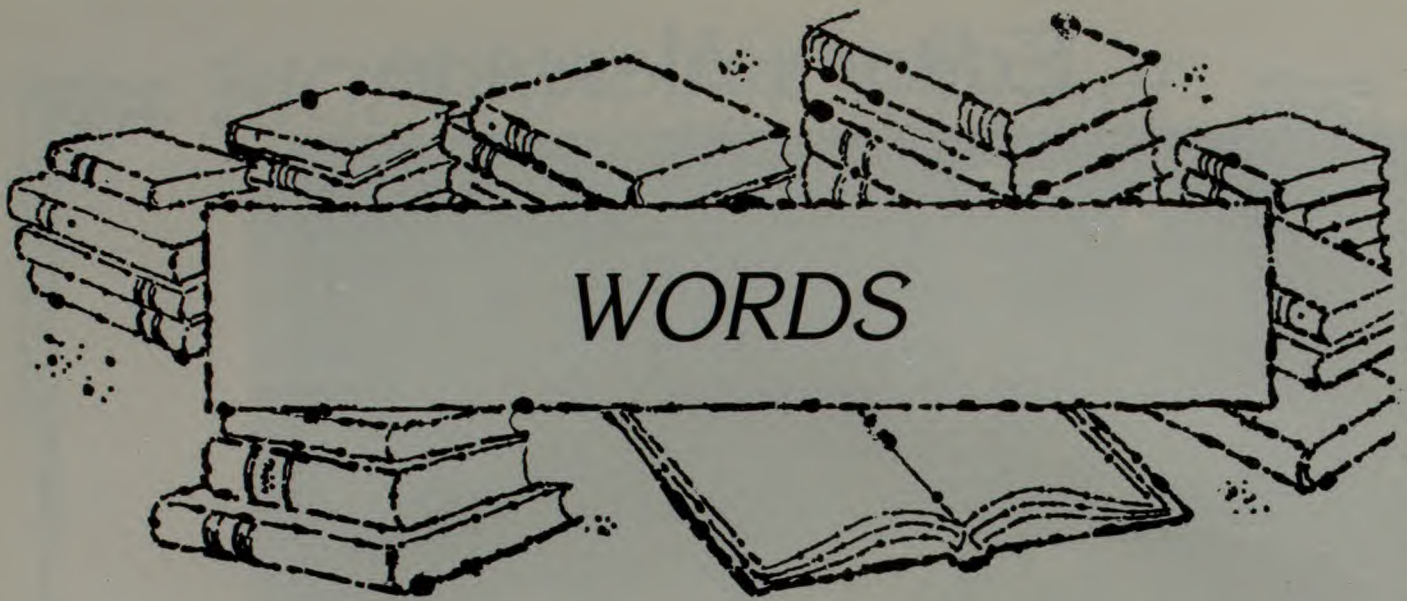
"I have only to take up this or that to flood my soul with memories." —Madame Deluzy.

"When words are scarce they're seldom spent in vain." —Shakespeare.

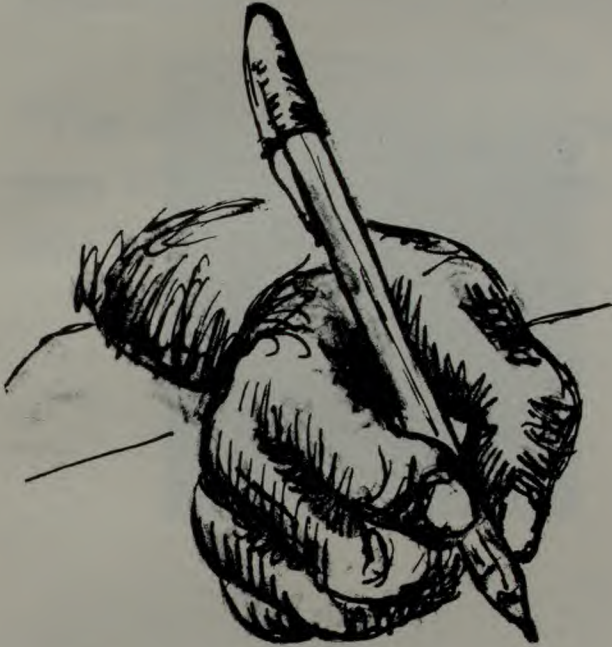
